Advanced Placement United States History

I. Overview of the Course

Advanced Placement (AP) United States History is designed to offer students the equivalent of an introductory college level course in United States history. You will learn the analytic skills and factual knowledge necessary to deal critically with the problems and materials in U. S. History. Students successfully completing this course will

- learn how to assess historical materials and to weigh the evidence and interpretations presented in historical scholarship
- develop the skills necessary to arrive at conclusions based on an informed judgment and to present reasons and evidence clearly and persuasively in essay format.

II. Course Objectives (Curriculum Requirements)

Themes: AP US History highlights twelve themes that will help you think conceptually and focus on historical change over time:

- 1. American diversity
- 2. American identity
- 3. culture
- 4. demographic changes
- 5. economic transformations
- 6. environment
- 7. globalization
- 8. politics and citizenship

- 11. slavery and its legacies in North America
- 12. war and diplomacy.

Skills: AP US History addresses specific academic skills in addition to content knowledge. Students will develop the following skills:

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- 1. analyzing and interpreting primary sources including documentary material, maps, statistical tables, and pictorial and graphic evidence of historical events
- 2. analyzing evidence and interpretations presented in historical scholarship
- 3. note-taking from printed materials, lectures, and discussions
- 4. writing analytical and interpretive essays such as document based questions and thematic essays
- 5. writing analytical and research papers
- 6. expressing ideas clearly and precisely
- 7. citing sources and crediting the ideas of others.

Students will be given frequent practice in each of these skills.

VA Standards of Learning: This course will also cover the Virginia Standards of Learning (SOL) for VA and US History.

The focus of the VA SOLs is the study of the historical development of American ideas and institutions. These standards emphasize concepts in civics, economics, and geography and a basic knowledge of American culture through a chronological survey of major issues, movements, people, and events in United States and VA history. They require that you use historical and geographical analysis skills to explore the events, people, and ideas that fostered our national identity.

III. Course Materials

Required Textbook

Other Materials

A variety of other readings and primary and secondary sources will be used during the course such as

- documentary material, maps, statistical tables, and pictorial and graphic evidence of historical events
- writing excerpts and essays from historians representing different schools of thought.

The teacher will provide these materials or students will have access to them via the school's media center or Internet.

IV. Grading

Your academic progress will be evaluated through a variety of assessments.

Marking Period (Quarter) Grades will be based on:

- · Tests and Quarterly Assessments
- Quizzes
- Class Activities
- Writing assignments including DBQs and thematic essays
- Projects/Papers.

The Semester Grade will be calculated as follows:

40% = First Quarter (9 Weeks)

40% = Second Quarter (9 Weeks)

20% = Exam.

The Advanced Placement Exam is administered in May to all students enrolled in AP US History. If you perform well, you may earn college credits and be exempt from taking a US History course in college.

The VA Standards of Learning (SOL) End-of-Course Test for VA & US History will also be administered in May. It consists of 70 multiple-choice questions. Students who pass the test will receive a verified credit towards high school graduation.

VI. Course Outline

AP US History is a full academic year course (two semesters) and is organized into four quarters that are each nine weeks long.

Each unit will include the following:

- 1. discussions of and writing about related historiography
 - how interpretations of events have changed over time,
 - how the issues of one time period have had an impact on the experiences and decisions of subsequent generations,
 - · how such reevaluations of the past continue to shape the way historians see the world today.
- 2. analysis and interpretation of primary sources including documentary material, maps, statistical tables, and pictorial and graphic evidence of historical events

- how to categorize documents
 how to recognize bias in documents,
 how to obtain historical evidence from documents
- 3. writing analytical and interpretive essays such as document based questions and thematic essays.
